

Teacher's notes!

1. Academic integrity means being honest, and ethical in your academic work.
2. Plagiarism means using someone else's work without giving them proper credit.
3. Citing, rephrasing, using a plagiarism checker before submitting, etc.
4. You must cite the source every time you incorporate information, words, or ideas that is not your own.
5. Citing a source consists of :
 - An in-text citation (the author and usually the page).
 - A "Reference" page (included on a separate page at the end of the essay).
