WARM UP ACTIVITIES

These are some activities you can do with your students to introduce the story. Choose the one that is most suitable for your learners.

Warm up Discussion: Do you know what a piranha is? What do you know about them? Are they friendly? What would you like to know about piranhas?

Interesting Facts about Piranhas:

- They live in rivers in South America.
- They live in groups called a shoal.
- They have sharp teeth.
- They eat fish, plants and seeds.
- Piranhas' jaws are so strong that they can crush a human hand!
- They can sense when there is blood in the water.

<u>Pictionary</u>: Play Pictionary with the following food and body parts: bananas, silver beet, peas, plums, melons, knees, feet.

WHILE READING ACTIVITIES

Vocabulary

As you read, explain difficult words as they come up.

Interaction with students

Stop briefly to ask questions about some of the illustrations. What do you see in this picture? Can you describe piranha? What color is it? Is it friendly? Is it angry? Why?

What happens next?

Ask students to guess what will happen in the story. What will (the character) do next?

Critical Thinking Questions

- Do you think Brian can convince his family to eat veggies? Why? Why not?
- What are some foods that you have never eaten?
 Why haven't you tried them?
- Do you think you should try some new foods?
 Why? Why not?
- What is your favourite fruit? Why?

AFTER READING ACTIVITIES

Sort the pictures out!

Provide a series of pictures of different animals, and see if children can sort them into those which eat meat, those which mainly eat plants and those which eat both (See page 8)

Game Time! Rhyming Words

Draw attention to the rhymes in the story, like banana/piranha, silverbeet/feet, plums/bums. Show the names of some other foods and body parts. Can children read the words and find the matching rhyme?






CRAFT

- 1. Print off the piranha template provided.
